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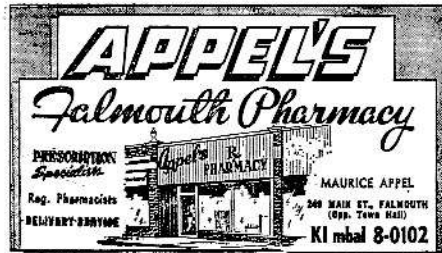

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MEET THE STAFF

W. HAYDEN BOYERS, Producer of the Players at Highfield and Professor of Romance Languages and Literature at Oberlin College, has been head of this organization since its beginning. Dr. Boyers headed the establishment of the summer season on the Cape and has been its guiding spirit ever since. Having worked with G & S for over ten years, Dr. Boyers has developed an understanding of these light operas that is rare in this country and highly respected among the D'Oyly Carte Savoyards.

Dr. Roberts Rugh, Treasurer, is listed in *Who's Who in America* as "Professor of radiology Columbia University; director of research on biological effects of ionizing radiation; Trustee of Marine Biological Laboratory; Member of American Association of Roentgenology, Society of Cancer Research, Radiological Society of North America, British Institute of Radiology, American Society of Zoologists . . . American Association of Anatomists, Society of Experimental Biology and Medicine, Harvey Society, American Association for the Advancement of Science; Author . . ." but he is better known to all Oberlinites as a member of the Oberlin Alumni Council and Number One supporter of the Oberlin Players since their arrival in Mashpee ten years ago.

ROBERT GIBSON, Director for the Players, is returning for his second summer at Highfield. Mr. Gibson directed the D'Oyly Carte Opera Company for 11 years before becoming associated with the Oberlin College Gilbert and Sullivan Players. He received wide acclaim in England for his interpretation of *Princess Ida* on its revival in 1954 after it lay dormant for thirty years. Well known as a lecturer at English universities and at the British Council at Stratford-on-Avon, Mr. Gibson is the leading authority today on the interpretation of Gilbert and Sullivan.

JAMES PAUL, working this summer as Musical Director after spending two years as associate director under Robert Kries, brings to Highfield the wealth of experience needed to conduct an orchestra in the players tradition. Jim is a voice major in the Oberlin Conservatory of Music and will attend the Mozarteum in Salzburg next year to continue his studies. Besides his work at Highfield in past summers, Jim has done a great deal of choral conducting and was Robert Fountain's assistant with the Oberlin College Choir, acclaimed the finest collegiate choral group in the country.

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MEET THE CAST

RICHARD FIRMIN has returned for his fifth summer with the Players and brings with him a wealth of experience in performing G & S. This winter in the campus production of **Princess Ida**, Dick celebrated his 175th G & S performance and will pass the 200 mark later this summer. Dick has also appeared on the Oberlin stage in various productions of opera and straight drama such as **Magic Flute**, **Falstaff**, **The Zoo Story** and **Macbeth**. Last summer Dick worked with Boris Goldovsky at his Oglebay Park Workshop. During this summer Dick is studying with Fredrick Jagel, former Metropolitan Opera tenor.

JAN EWING is an old hand at G & S having spent three years in the campus organization before coming to the Cape with the Players this summer. He has appeared in such roles as Robin Oakapple in **Ruddigore**, Giuseppe in **Gondoliers**, the Duke in **Patience**, and KoKo in **The Mikado**. Jan has also appeared on the Oberlin stage in such operas as **Magic Flute**, **La Boheme**, and **Carmen**. A Conservatory student, he spent his junior year at Salzburg studying with Herr Kammersanger Max Lorenz such roles as Cavaradossi from **Tosca**, Lieutenant Pinkerton from **Madam Butterfly**, and Max from **Der Freischutz**.

HELENE FARRAS, returning for her second summer, will be remembered for her portrayal of Helene in **La Belle Helene** in the summer of 1959. Since that summer Helene has spent a year at the Mozarteum in Salzburg and was a lead in a production Landestheater in Salzburg. In her senior year at Oberlin, Helene sang the role of Pamina in the Conservatory's production of Mozart's **Magic Flute**. In the Metropolitan Regional Auditions, Helene was the second place winner for the Great Lakes Region and the recipient of a \$200 award. Helene Farras, this June, was awarded the 31st Kate Neal Kinley Memorial Scholarship by the University of Illinois for private study in the Fine Arts. Helene will use her \$2000 to continue her vocal training in New York with Madam Thelma Votipka of the Metropolitan Opera.

WILLIAM KLOSS, returning for his third summer with the Players, is doing postgraduate work in Art History at Oberlin. Bill has had a great deal of experience in straight drama besides his association with the Oberlin Players. Bill has worked at the American Shakespeare Academy in New York studying with Phoebe Brand, current directress of the New York production of **The Portrait of an Artist as a Young Man**. He followed up this interest last summer as a scholarship actor at the Colorado Shakespeare Festival. Bill has a wide experience in dramatics, having played in **Così fan Tutte**, **Romanoff and Juliet**, **King Lear** as well as working with Richard Firmin in **The Zoo Story**.

LEWIS GREENSFELDER, now spending his first summer at Highfield, comes to the Players from Temple University where he is an Honor student in English Literature. Although Lew, a voice and repertoire student of Martial Singher, the noted French baritone of the Metropolitan Opera, has sung several operatic roles, he most desires a career as a recitalist. He has already given a considerable number of recitals, including several full programs of German Lieder. Lew had a great honor when he understudied Martyn Green in the Boston Arts Festival production of **HMS Pinafore**.

SANDRA PROVOST, June graduate of the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, spent her junior year at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria. Sandra toured with the Oberlin College Choir which is rated as one of the finest in the country and sang for two years with the Choir in Oberlin. She has performed major leads in productions presented by the Oberlin Opera Lab. This year she played Madame Dubounet in **The Boyfriend** which was directed by Falmouth's Beverly Ball. To the Gilbert and Sullivan Players she is remembered for her performance of **Katisha** in **The Mikado** last spring. Sandra

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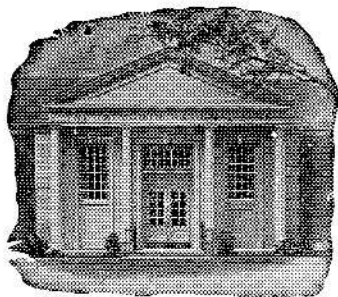

plans to enter the New England Conservatory on a scholarship this September.

IAN ALPERN, the company's bass-baritone, graduated from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music this spring. Even though this is Ian's first year at Highfield, he is familiar with G & S through his role as Pooh-Bah in the Oberlin production of *Mikado* this past spring. Ian was extremely active in the Oberlin College Opera Lab throughout his years at Oberlin. He performed leading roles in six major productions, including *La Boheme* and *The Marriage of Figaro*. Ian went abroad to study voice at Salzburg, Austria during his junior year and was a Fulbright finalist during his senior year at Oberlin. His performance as the Boatswain's Mate in the Boston Arts Festival production of *Pinafore* won him the critical acclaim of many.

KATHLEEN CAMPBELL is spending her first year with the Players on the Cape after a successful freshman year in the campus organization with the lead role of Yum-Yum in the spring production of *The Mikado*. Kit is studying voice at Oberlin with Miss Ellen Repp, dramatic soprano well-known on the continent.

ROBERT PERKINS spent two years working in the campus G & S group before coming to the Cape. Spending his last two years in high school doing four leads in four productions, Bob, upon arriving at Oberlin, switched his interest to Gilbert and Sullivan and has appeared in *Gondoliers*, and as Arac in the Campus production of *Princess Ida* as well as Pish-Tush in *The Mikado*. Bob was a physics major at Oberlin and plans to continue study at Bowling Green University next year.
